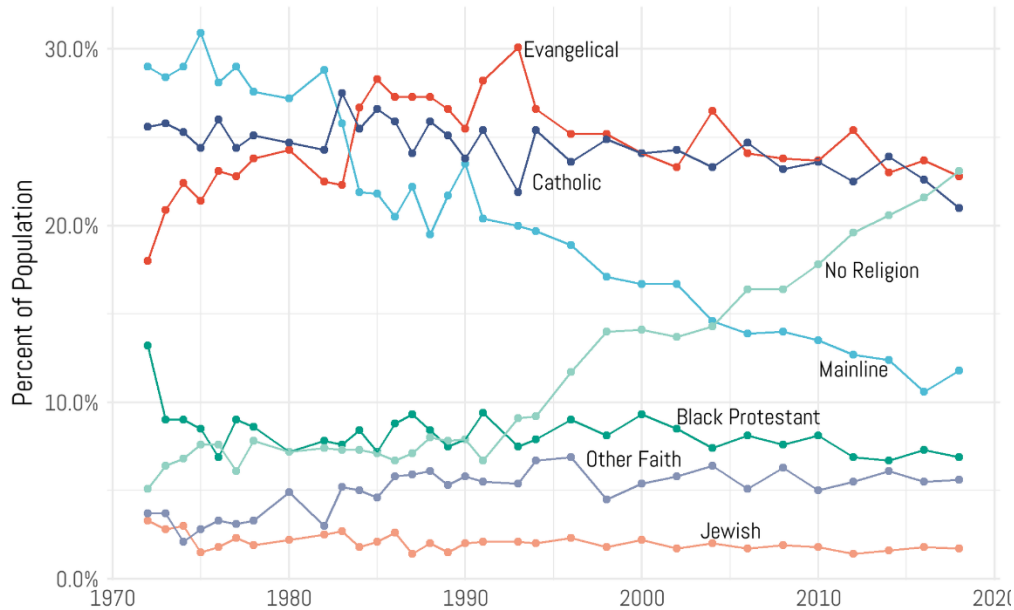
“Unaffiliated” citizens outnumber citizens from ALL Non-Christian Faiths Combined nearly 4:1! ²

- “Unaffiliated”/“Nones” = 22.8% of U.S. Population, including 3% = Atheist, 4% = Agnostic, and 15.8% = “Nothing in Particular”. Within the “NiP” group 8.8% felt “Religion isn’t important.”
- Non-Christian = 5.9%, Jewish = 1.9%, Muslim = .9%, Buddhist = .7%, and Hindu = .7%)
